LOVE AND WISDOM: A GOOD START

RABBI'S ANNUAL MEETING ADDRESS 2021

Welcome Board Members, Officers, and Congregants,

Shema Koleynu Adonai Eloheyenu, God Above take these words that I share and let them be received in the open hearts and open minds of all.

It has truly been an honor to serve this community for the past year. It has been a year of progress, challenge, change, and growth. I would like to use this time to thank all of those who have made this past year in the synagogue an enriching and positive experience. Even with a few bumps along the way, we have continued to travel the road together with success.

While formulating a vision for my time at the Congregation, I was asked to think about the possibilities for our community to bring us forward and for new members to join our shul with confidence.

I believe in the past year we have made wonderful progress. The following are some examples of our gains this past year: 1) Updating our website, 2) reforming the Hebrew curriculum to reflect the needs of our youth by creatively arranging their Hebrew education in the limited time allocated while including their families and engaging them all in fun programs 3) welcoming interfaith young new families who are already busy with their modern lives and modern priorities. Additionally we sponsored relevant JUF grant programs by our own members, keeping our hunger for learning and the need for community connections alive — even in a pandemic.

Teaching Hebrew and tutoring Bar/Bat Mitzvah students has been a bright spot in my position here. This year I used my discretionary funds to enable one of our youth to attend Jewish Summer Camp. I will also begin a monthly confirmation class for our 7 youth who have been bar/bat mitzvahed and desire to con-

tinue their connection to our community. Also Teaching Alef-Bet to our adults, or continuing on in this curriculum, will be included in 2022.

In addition, I have re-established bridges between our community and the Jewish Community as a whole in Northern Illinois. Together with Mark Turk and Amy Bloomberg, I have put JJC on the map with JUF, JCC, JCFS and BBYO. The results of this beginning were reflected this past Sunday when the very first BBYO Southern Community Meeting of 12 youth was held in Joliet, in OUR BUILDING.

I have also worked together with Jewish Children & Family Services to create social services accessibility and education for our area, thanks to the help of Diane Halvani and the Caring Bridges program of learning. We will now be able to reach out to those in grief and provide counseling and care to congregants in our community that feel isolated and alone.

Taking my place in the Will County and Southern Suburban Community, I look forward to creating solid relationships with the other Rabbi's in the area and creating programs with the leaders of other faiths, such as last year's interfaith events. In addition, I will continue to serve on the Food and Shelter Board of Will County.

We have done a lot. It is a good start. We can do better. We can use our presence in the community as an example of generosity and learning. We can think ahead to how we might become a partner with more of our community agencies and lead our area in giving, education and service.

I pride myself of being a hands-on Rabbi. I have enjoyed being an integral part of the Spaghetti Dinner, the Open House, and the Hanukkah Bazaar. I have never been afraid to get my hands dirty and to get the job done. In fact, this commitment to service is a thread throughout my entire professional career of being in service to others.

For those of you whom I have gotten to know, I am so grateful for the connections we have made and the ability to provide constant and compassionate leadership. For those who have yet to get to know me, I'm offering you a hint into who I am.

The two qualities that I seek to exemplify in my role as Rabbi are Love and Wisdom. My mentor Rabbi Joseph Gelberman stated, "Love allows change. Wisdom explains it. Love and Wisdom together capitalize on it. Love and wisdom, when united, are spiritually powerful allies directing our actions into the fulfilling

channels we seek."

By creating a loving and open space for conversation and relevancy in Judaism for our ever-changing population, I seek to develop the wisdom to understand those things that need to change and those things that need to stay the same. The ideals on which this community have been built can continue to include new and accessible concepts of Spirituality support the individual's personal practice of Judaism and leads one to enter the heart of Torah and the gifts of our faith and culture.

It is my goal that we continue to apply our capacity for Love, balanced with Wisdom, to bring about even more growth and cohesiveness in our congregation than we have shown in the past. My goal as your Spiritual Leader in Joliet is for us to become progressively more relevant than in the recent past and to continue to grow — to manifest JJC's potential as a strong and healthy congregation.

I am always here to listen.

We have so much more to look forward to together. We have many simchas and enriching events already on the calendar, including an upcoming event with Tal Schnieder, the Israeli reporter. RECIPE OF THE MONTH

This month's recipe is great for holiday get-togethers. The famous Carrot Ring recipe of Elizabeth Turk, of Special memory. Elizabeth or Bobbie as she was known was an artist, teacher, wife, mother, grandmother, an active congregant and although not a great cook, did have a few good recipes. So work at grating the carrots and make the ring and think of Bobbie with each tasty bite.

CARROT RING

1 cup margarine	1 tsp lemon juice
1/2 cup brown sugar	1 tsp baking powder
1 1/4 cups flour	1 tsp baking soda
1 cup grated carrots	1 Tbsp water
1 egg	

Cream butter, add brown sugar and cream together. Add egg and mix. Add grated carrots and after mixing carrots in, add flour slowly. In a small dish, mix lemon juice, baking powder, baking soda and water. They will fizz. Add lemon juice mixture to carrot mixture. Use hand or electric mixer. Grease a ring mold and spoon in batter. Bake at 350°F for 1 hour. Cool a few minutes and turn onto plate. You can fill the center with well drained, cooked peas.







"HANUKKAH BLESSINGS FOR CANDLES & GUIDELINES"

חנוכה, חג שמחה



The Brachot

The first two brachot (blessings) are said every night when lighting the candles:

ברוך אתה, יי אלהינו, מלך העולם, אשר קדשנו במצותיו וצונו להדליק נר של חנוכה.

Bah-ruch At-tah A-do-nai Elo-hay-moo Me-lech Ha-o-lam A-sheh Kidshanoo B'mits'votav Y-tsi-yah-moo Uhd-lik Nare Shel Hanukkah. "Praised be Thou, O Lord our God, Ruler of the world, Who has sanctified us to kindle the Hanukkah lights."

ברוך אתה, יי אלהינו, מלך העולם, שעשאה נסים לאבותינו בנמים בהם בזמן הזה.

Bah-ruch At-tah A-do-nai Elo-hay-moo Me-lech Ha-o-lam She-a-sa Nis-seem Lah-vo-tay-moo Ba-yah-meem Ha-tem Baz-man Ha-zeh. "Praised be Thou, O Lord our God, Ruler of the world, Sovereign of the Universe, Who performed miracles for our ancestors at this season in ancient days."

On the first night recite the following blessing after the other blessings:

ברוך אתה, יי אלהינו, מלך העולם, שהחיינו וקיימנו ורהיצינו לזמן הזה.

Bah-ruch At-tah A-do-nai Elo-hay-moo Me-lech Ha-o-lam She-he-che-yi-noo V'ki-y-mah-noo V-he-gi-a-moo Laz-man Ha-zeh. "Praised be Thou, O Lord our God, Ruler of the world, Who sustained us and enabled us to reach this day."

1. Load the menorah from the right; light the candles from the left.
2. Place your hanukiah/menorah in the window nearest the street so that all can see.
3. Candle holders in traditional hanukiot are all on the same level, with a higher or separate shamash.
4. On Shabbat Hanukkah, light the Hanukkah candles before you light the Shabbat candles.
5. Light your candles after nightfall but early enough so that people can see them.

Hanukkah is a wonderful holiday filled with important lessons. From Hanukkah we learn about heroism and about the right to be different, about faith and about miracles. The following candle by candle guide may help you consider some of these important issues. As you light candles each night, ask yourself the following questions:

- First night:** Do I know any modern day Maccabees?
- Second Night:** What does it mean to be part of a people? As a Jew, what special responsibilities do I have?
- Third night:** Have I "proclaimed the mitzade" by helping someone understand the true meaning of this holiday?
- Fourth night:** Have I witnessed any miracles in my own lifetime?
- Fifth night:** Have I given Tzedakah today?
- Sixth night:** Have I done anything today to improve the world?
- Seventh night:** Have I brought happiness into someone's life today?
- Eighth night:** What questions will I ask myself as I light the candles next year?

Section 5 Fee Schedule

See attached: General Rules and Fees.

Payment of the Fee is due two (2) weeks prior to Event Date. Fees only include use of Facility. Cost of food, liquor, security (if any) and Rabbinical Services are extra to the Host.

Section 6 Insurance REQUIREMENTS For Facilities Usage

It is REQUIRED that the host provide the Joliet Jewish Congregation with either a Special Event Policy or an Event Rider under your Homeowner's insurance policy, with the Joliet Jewish Congregation named as an additional insured in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000, two(2) calendar days prior to the event. Either type of insurance is required by the Joliet Jewish Congregation (this requirement is for the host's sole financial safety and security)

Section 7 Indemnification

The Host hereby agrees to release, indemnify and hold harmless the Joliet Jewish Congregation, its officers, agents, employees, board members and volunteers ("INDEMNITEES") from and against all liability, including claims, demands, losses, damages and expenses of every kind and description to persons (including but not limited to death) or property associated with the use of the Joliet Jewish Congregation Facilities. This includes liability resulting directly or indirectly from acts or omissions of indemnitees or the Host, unless such liability results from the sole negligence of Indemnitees. Such indemnification includes attorney's fees, court costs, mediation/arbitration costs, as well as costs of damage to property and expenses of every kind resulting from the use of the Facilities. This Section 8 shall bind any and all successors, assigns, agents, employees, heirs, family members, spouses, personal representatives, or anyone else claiming to represent the Host.

Section 8 Cancellation

In the event of cancellation, any amount paid by Host to Joliet Jewish Congregation shall be fully refundable to Host only if more than seven (7) calendar days advance notice of cancellation is given in writing.

If by reason of fire, action of the elements, catastrophe or similar other causes, the agreed Facilities cannot be made available by the Joliet Jewish Congregation, for use by the Host and the event shall for this reason be canceled, then each party does hereby release the other from any and all claims, demands, agreements and liabilities whatsoever that each may have had, except that the Joliet Jewish Congregation shall refund to Host any advance rental payments made by Host to the Joliet Jewish Congregation, less costs reasonably incurred by the Joliet Jewish Congregation in anticipation of the event and not including the non-refundable deposit.

Section 9 Non-Smoking Facility

The Joliet Jewish Congregation building is a non-smoking facility and the use of tobacco products is strictly prohibited on the premises.

Section 10 Change of Event Date

If the Host needs to change the reservation date, it is asked that the change be made in writing seven (7) calendar days prior to the original reservation event date. All requests for changes must be made in writing to the Office or House Chairman of the Joliet Jewish Congregation.

Section 11 Right to Refuse Or Deny Rental Application

The Joliet Jewish Congregation reserves the right to refuse or deny occupancy and use of any of its Facilities for purposes and activities if such refusal or denial is in the best interests of the Joliet Jewish Congregation.

Section 12 Special Requirements

- A. Kosher Kitchen. The Joliet Jewish Congregation maintains a Kosher Kitchen which requires special considerations. The Kitchen may be used only under the strict supervision of an appointed Member of the Joliet Jewish Congregation. Non-Kosher Dairy foods may be used only in designated areas. "Kosher" are those foods that conform to the regulations of Jewish dietary law.
- B. Clean Up. The Host is responsible for leaving the portions of the building that were used in the condition in which they were found prior to the event. This includes, but is not limited to: a) Returning tables and chairs to original set up; b) Washing dishes, pots and pans and returning to cabinets; c) sweeping floors clean of debris; d) removing garbage and recycling to appropriate outside containers; and e) retaining cleanup crew, if required. Food and drink are only permitted in the social hall and foyer and not in other parts of the building. In addition, the Host is responsible for closing and locking the building, closing all windows and turning out all lights.

Section 13 Miscellaneous Provisions

This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of Host and the Joliet Jewish Congregation, their respective agents, successors, and authorized assigns.

This Agreement shall be construed pursuant to the laws of the State of Illinois.
